CHARLESTON — Lonnell Poole wasn't the only Trojan smiling, following Bloom's dramatic surge to a tie for the Class AA team championship with heavily-favored East St. Louis.

## Welcome Home

Bloom's triumphant track team, including two individual champions, sprinter George Carter and pole vaulter Jim Sarros, will be officially welcomed home with a celebration scheduled for 1 p.m. today in Veazey gym.

ros and Efrem Stringfellow were also glowing. Their joy was bubbling over.

"Nobody picked me to even place in the 100 or 220," exclaimed Carter. Yesterday he became the state's fastest human, winning the 100 in a blazing 9.6 seconds and later finishing second in the 220.

"LAST YEAR WE were the team who was supposed to win everything — but we were second," Carter continued. "But it was a different story this time. We were relaxed. We weren't picked to win anything. We were the underdog, and it suited us just fine."

Teammate Stringfellow chimed in.

"We showed them," he cried. "Heck, they didn't even have me anywhere in sight in the triple jump, but we changed all that." Efrem was second with a 48-8 1/2

An elated Poole summed it all up. "All year long we didn't have any pressure on us. We weren't looked at as a state power. I'll tell you what, I don't mind a tie at all."

WHEN THE FINAL race was completed on O'Brien Field at Eastern Illinois university yesterday, Bloom and East St. Louis were deadlocked with 46 team points apiece.

Carter's victory in the 100 and Sarros' state winning pole vault record of 15-2 ¼ set the tone for Bloom's first Illinois track championship since 1959.

In fact, the south suburbs had a banner day. Sandburg's unbelievable dynamic distance duo of Bob Hicks and Tom Graves were awesome, leading the Eagles to a third place team standing, garnering 28 points.

Graves, a junior, successfully defended his two-mile crown, breezing to a brilliant 8:51.87 performance. Afterwards, Tom went to nearby Lantz fieldhouse to rest, thus not attending the awards ceremony. The reason was simple. Graves then came back to take second in the mile run - his 4:09.3 time being second to champion Hicks' 4:08.6.

HICKS WAS never behind in the race. "I don't usually get out ahead and stay there, but that was my plan today," Bob pointed out. "I decided early in the week that I had to go out early and take control." Hicks did, as Thornridge's John Sullivan, second for most of the way, hit the tape third in 4:11.3.

Sarros became Bloom's fifth pole vault champion, dominating his final round field. Mike McCrindle (1976), Tim Johnson (1973 and 1974) and Jan Johnson (1968) were previous Trojan winners.

Carter, like Hicks, was worried all week about getting a quick start. When you're running the 100 and 220 yard dashes, a good start can be the determining factor.

"I won the 100 coming out of the blocks," said George. "Getting away fast was the key for me. All my time has been spent on this facet of the race."

MORTON WEST'S Tony Krainik stopped Carter from a double, as he set a new 220 state time of 21.5, Carter winding up second in 21.9. Lockport's Joe Tucker captured the triple jump in a record leap of 49-7 3/4, Bloom's Stringfellow runnerup in 48-8 1/2. Thornton's Duane Bibbie was seventh.

Additional Trojan points were earned when the 440 relay was fifth, when Dennis Carrabine placed sixth in the 120 yard high hurdles and when Chris Alexander was sixth in the shot put.

Kankakee Westview's Mike Graves covered the 330 low hurdles in 36.9 seconds for third, while area fourths went to Homewood-Flossmoor's Bruce Keene in the 880, Richards' Dave Bensema in the two-mile and Oak Lawn's Mike Lehmann in the shot put.

Hicks, a second place finisher in the mile last year, was a disappointing 13th at last fall's state cross-country meet, a race won by Graves. Ever since, Bob has been pointing toward a strong conlc; usion to his high school career.

"I was relaxed all spring," he said. "Tom and I have paced ourselves well and pointed toward certain goals. This was a super way to end my career." Graves is only a junior.

INDIVIDUAL FIRSTS went to Quincy's Pat McCulla in the discus, East St. Louis' Darnell Belt in the 440, Lane Tech's Tyrone Williams in the 330 yard low hurdles, Brother Rice's Jim Solus in the long jump, North Chicago's Nate Lundy in the 120 yard high hurdles and Galesburg's Dean McKillip in the shot put. Mendal captured the 440 relay, while East St. Louis took the mile and two-mile relays.

In winning the high jump competition, as expected, Sycamore's Gail Olson eclipsed the 7-3 ¼ barrier, which shattered existing state marks. Peoria Central's Dave Ayoub recorded a sizzling 1:48.86 in the 880, missing the national prep mark by three-tenths of a second.

Kaneland won the Class A title, accumulating 57 points, as sensational Mark Claypool led his team with victories in the long jump, 220 and 440. Providence's Kevin Johnson was fourth in the 100 and seventh in the 220, also helping the 440 Celtic relay crew to a third place position.
